

What are VSCs?

- Vessel Safety Checks are voluntary vessel inspections conducted upon the request of a recreational boat owner/operator
- Can be performed by certified examiners of the Coast Guard Auxiliary or the United States Power Squadrons (aka America's Boating Club)
- Purpose is to check that all equipment required by Federal and State regulations is available, approved, accessible, unexpired and in good condition
- Recreational vessels under 65 feet are eligible, including PWCs and paddle craft but will not be covered in this presentation
- There are no penalties or fines for inspection failures and such are not reported to authorities

Vessel Description

One of the first items of information that the Examiner will determine is the length in feet of the inspected vessel as that will affect the equipment required.

As shown by the following chart, the rules define four classes:

- 1. Less than 16 feet
- 2. 16 feet to less than 26 feet
- 3. 26 feet to less than 40 feet.
- 4. 40 feet to less than 65.6 feet

Vessel Safety Checklist

Decal (Mandatory) Requirements:

- Display of numbers
- Registration/Documentation
- Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs)
- Visual Distress Signals (VDS)
- Fire Extinguishers (Older than 12 years must be replaced)
- Ventilation
- Backfire Flame Control
- Sound Producing Devices
- Navigation Lights
- Pollution Placard
- MARPOL Trash Placard

Vessel Safety Checklist (Cont'd)

Decal (Mandatory) Requirements:

- Marine Sanitation Devices
- Navigation Rules (Vessels 49 feet and over)
- State and Local Requirements (Anchor and line required by NYS)
- Overall Vessel Condition
- Engine Cutoff Switch (Federal requirement only at this time)

Recommendations and Discussion Items (Not required for Decal Award):

- Marine Radio
- Dewatering Device and Backup
- Mounted Fire Extinguishers
- Anchor and Line for Area
- First Aid Kit
- □ PIW (fna, Man Overboard) Kit
- Accident Reporting
- Nautical Charts
- Fuel management

- □ Float Plan
- Weather and Sea Conditions
- Boating Checklist
- Safe Boating Classes

How to sign up for a VSC





Both the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the United States Power Squadrons have certified vessel examiners who will perform a free Vessel Safety Check ("VSC") at your boat, at a time of mutual convenience.

Go to www.cgaux.org, click on "Get A Vessel Safety Check" and you will be taken to the Coast Guard Auxiliary site to fill out a contact form. The closest examiners from both organizations will contact you.

Preparing for an Inspection

Inspections generally run from 30 to 60 minutes. You can expedite the process by being well prepared. By reference to the Boater's Guide books mentioned in this presentation, you can anticipate the Examiner's requests thus ensuring that you have the required equipment on board, it is up-to- date and in good condition.
